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Community-Based Correctional Facility Annual Report Fiscal Year 2005

Executive Summary

Ohio Community-Based Correctional Facility (CBCF) programs are residential sanctions that provide local Courts of Common Pleas a sanctioning alternative to prison. Each Program is administered by a Judicial Corrections Board that is comprised of Common Pleas Court judges within a specific geographic region. During Fiscal Year 2005, CBCF subsidy programs received a funding appropriation of \$ 55,054,445 to support eighteen CBCF's providing service to all 88 counties in Ohio.

CBCF PROGRAM ACTIVITY

In Fiscal Year 2005, CBCF Programs received \$55,054,445 to support 18 facilities serving 88 Ohio counties.

- 5,369 offenders participated in CBCF programs:
 - \$10,254 annual average cost per offender
 - 6% convicted of 2nd degree felony
 - 15% convicted of 3rd degree felony
 - 31% convicted of 4th degree felony
 - 43% convicted of 5th degree felony
 - 82% Male
 - 65% White
 - 32% African American
 - Average age at admission 29 years old
 - 75% successful termination
 - Average length of stay 124 days

Year End Highlights:

- Stark Regional Community Correction Center received the Clifford Skeen Award for CBCF's.
- Jake Jones of Northeast Ohio Community Alternative Program, received the CBCF Professional Achievement Award.
- CBCF Offenders performed over 240,228 hours of community service work within their respective communities.
- Offenders earned \$2,634,037; paid \$41,775 in restitution; \$319,625 in court costs; and \$85,118 in child support.
