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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Social and Demographic Characteristics

- Of the 3234 offenders included in the study, 87.0% were male and 13.0% were female.
- The racial composition of the intake sample was: 54.1% African American, 45.7% Caucasian, and 0.1% Native American. A small group of inmates (0.2%) of the inmates belonged to other racial groups.
- The four counties with the highest numbers of offenders committed to Ohio prisons in the 2000 Intake Sample included: Cuyahoga (25.0%), Hamilton (10.5%), Franklin (9.3%), and Summit (6.1%).
- The overall average age of offenders included in the intake study was 29.8 years with a median of 29.0 years of age. The average age for males was 29.3 years; the average age for females was 33.1 years.
- At the time of admission, the majority of offenders (67.4%) were single (never married), 11.5% were married and 20.5% of offenders entering the prison system were either separated or divorced. The remaining 0.6% offenders were widowed.
- At the time of arrest, 46.9% of the offenders were unemployed; 37.8% were employed full-time.
- Records indicated that compared to males, females experienced greater levels of:
 - ❖ Physical abuse as a child or adolescent (female = 22.3%; male = 7.6%);
 - ❖ Sexual abuse as a child or adolescent (female =24.6%; male = 4.3%);
 - ❖ History of mental health problems (female = 39.1%; male = 20.0%).
- Similar levels of recent drug abuse (female = 80.3%; male = 78.4%) and histories of drug abuse (female = 83.3%; male = 81.6%) were found for both male and female offenders. Males were slightly more likely than females to have evidenced recent alcohol abuse (female = 44.3%; male = 57.0%) and a history of alcohol abuse (female = 53.1%; male = 64.4%). Females, however, were slightly more likely to have completed a substance abuse treatment program (female = 29.0%; male = 18.7%).

Current Most Serious Commitment Offense

- Considering the most serious offense for which each offender was committed, the four for which offenders were most often committed were:
 - ❖ Drug Abuse/Possession 21.5%
 - ❖ Drug Trafficking 8.1%
 - ❖ Theft 7.6%
 - ❖ Burglary 6.3%
- Most offenders pled guilty (96.6 %) to charges (female = 97.6%; male = 96.5%).

- Weapons were involved, in some manner, in the conviction offense in 26.4% of the cases in the intake study. *
- 28.8% of the offenders included in the intake sample were under the influence of drugs at the time of at least one of the instant conviction offenses (female = 35.9%; male = 27.7%).

Criminal History

- Men were more likely than women to have had at least one previous prison incarceration (female = 35.7%; male = 43.2%), and at least one prior jail incarceration (female = 50.8%; male = 53.2%);
- Women were more likely, however, to have had at least one prior adult supervision term (female = 77.5%; male = 73.9%) and at least one prior revocation of adult supervision (female = 55.4%; male = 49.5%).
- 71.5% of the offenders had prior adult convictions for non-violent misdemeanor offenses (female = 71.8%; male = 71.4%). Fewer offenders had prior adult convictions for violent misdemeanor offenses (Total = 26.7%; female = 14.1%; male = 28.6%).
- 59.5% of the intake sample had at least one prior adult felony conviction (female = 58.0%; male = 59.7%).
- More men than women had prior adult convictions for violent felony (non-sex) offenses (female = 9.3%; male = 20.1%).
- Overall, about a fifth of the offenders had prior adult convictions for felony drug use/possession (female = 21.4%; male = 19.3%).
- 13.4% of the intake sample had prior adult convictions for felony drug sale/trafficking offenses (female = 11.2%; male = 13.7%).

Assessment of SB2 Impact

- Only 5.4% of inmates admitted during the Intake 2000 were under Pre-Senate Bill 2 law (94.6% were Post-Senate Bill 2)
- A truly non-violent (TNV) offender is one who does not have a violent current conviction or indictment offense, nor a prior felony conviction for a violent or sex offense, nor any gun time, nor any weapon involvement in the current offense.
 - The intake data show that in 1996, 44.4% of the intake sample were classified as TNV offenders. About 36% of these were supervision violators (technical probation violators and new felonies committed by either probationers or parolees).

* “involved” includes situations where the offender feigned having a weapon or where a weapon was present but not used in the commitment offense, as well as situations in which a weapon was used to injure or kill.

- In 1998, 39.9% of the intake sample were classified as TNV offenders. About 54% of these were supervision violators.
- In 2000, 40.2% of the intake sample were classified as TNV offenders. About 49% of these were supervision violators.

The 2000 Intake data confirm the trend noted in 1998. Fewer admissions to DRC are TNV; those that are admitted are much more likely to be technical violators. It is somewhat surprising, however, that the impact has not been greater.

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this report is to present a basic profile of newly committed inmates entering the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (DRC) prison system during 2000. The profile of Intake 2000 inmates includes the following information: (1) demographic and social characteristics of the inmates; (2) characteristics of the current commitment offense, and; (3) the inmate's prior criminal history. These tables may be used to compare the characteristics of inmates entering the prison system across the years for which similar data have been collected (1985, 1992, 1996, 1997, and 1998).

Methodology

Intake Data – In general, data for intake studies are collected on all inmates who enter the DRC prison system during a two-month period. Information is obtained from three sources:

- (1) Interviews with inmates at reception centers;
- (2) Written investigations, and;
- (3) Microfiche from the records department to supplement partial or incomplete investigation reports.

The interviews with the inmates, conducted by DRC classification specialists, take place at DRC's three reception centers housed at Lorain Correctional Institution, Ohio Reformatory for Women, and the Correctional Reception Center. The emphasis is on social history information not consistently available in offender files.

The DRC would like to prepare a full investigation (either a PSI – Pre-Sentence Investigation – for the sentencing judge or an OBI – Offender Background Investigation – a similar document prepared with a focus on DRC information needs) for each new inmate. Unfortunately, resource and administrative demands prevent that on a routine basis. Inmates who will be serving sentences less than 90 days frequently enter the system without such a report. Also, the investigations for offenders expected to spend longer than three but less than 12 months are reduced in scope. During the two-month study period, however, APA staff are requested to write investigation reports for all offenders entering Ohio's prisons in order to obtain an accurate representation of all inmates entering the prisons during the intake study period (and, it is hoped, the entire year). The investigation reports primarily consist of pre-sentence investigation and offender background information reports produced by Adult Parole Authority (APA) staff. Most reports are written by APA officers based in the jurisdiction where the offender committed his/her offense(s). The rest are prepared by the probation departments in the committing counties. The report is supplemented, if appropriate, with information on types and amounts of drugs and the value of the theft crimes. Central Office classification specialists then read through each investigation report, collect and code the information not obtained from the intake interview for the Intake Study Report.

With such a large data collection effort, it is inevitable that some of the necessary information on offenders will be missing from the investigation reports. When information is missing, classification specialists must obtain microfiche records on inmates from the records bureau at Central Office, read through the available information and attempt to retrieve the missing information.

Data were collected on all inmates who entered the DRC prison system between May 15, 2000 and July 14, 2000. The resulting data set contains information on a sample of 3234 newly committed inmates received by DRC during this two-month period.

Caveats Regarding the Data

There are several limitations to the data of which the reader should be aware when assessing this information. First, the reader should bear in mind that the characteristics of the offense apply to the most serious conviction and second most serious offenses only. This results in the need for caution when trying to establish the proportion of offenders serving time for particular offenses. For example, an offender may have been convicted for felonious assault and domestic violence. The proportion of offenders currently entering prison for domestic violence will be underestimated when looking only at the proportion of offenders committed for domestic violence as the most serious offense. A more accurate representation may be found by also considering offenders for whom domestic violence was the second most serious offense; however, we are not able to identify the number of offenders committed for domestic violence as a third or fourth most serious offense. While we believe that considering the most and second most serious offenses captures important offense characteristics for the majority of offenders entering prison for any given offense, estimates using this data base must be considered conservative estimates. Similar precautions should be taken when estimating the various proportions of victim characteristics and other variables associated with particular offenses.¹ The data base also does not contain information on the number of counts of offenses upon which the inmate was sentenced.

A second concern regards juvenile offense data. The availability of juvenile records continues to be problematic. Many county juvenile courts have a policy of refusing access to juvenile records; some will permit access only with a signed waiver from the inmate. Other juvenile courts routinely destroy juvenile records for individuals born before a specific date. As a result, the completeness of the juvenile record information remains questionable. Great care should be taken when attempting to draw conclusions from juvenile criminal history information contained in the intake data bases.

The third concern deals with several limitations of adult criminal histories in general. The reader should be aware that the intake data reports only prior adult convictions, not arrests. No conclusions can be drawn regarding arrests from the data. There is also no data recorded on indictment charges nor plea bargaining for prior convictions. For example, it is possible that an inmate was at some previous time charged with a violent offense but agreed to plead guilty to a lesser, non-violent offense. As a result, there may be a number of individuals in the intake data base who are identified as having no prior convictions for violent offenses, but they actually do have a history of violent behavior.

Representativeness of Sample

It is important to note how representative this cohort of inmates is when compared to the inmates being admitted throughout the year. Consequently, the Intake 2000 should be comparable to FY2000 Intake inmates.

Structure of the Report

This report is organized into three sections. The first section presents the demographic and social characteristics of the 2000 intake sample. The second section provides information on the characteristics of the most serious current commitment offense. Information regarding the offender's prior criminal history is presented in the third section.

In reviewing the tables, please be aware that due to rounding percentages may not total exactly to 100%. This may be true for any table in this report.
