

Year End Highlights

- ◆ Emergency funding enabled six new 407 prison diversion non-support programs to be created in Butler, Clermont, Delaware, Franklin, Hamilton and Lorain counties.
- ◆ Jail diversion offenders earned \$48,877,770, paid \$519,654 in restitution, \$2,484,678 in court cost and fines, paid \$941,305 in child support and completed 218,861 hours of community service work hours.
- ◆ Emergency funding was also responsible for the creation of nine new 408 jail reduction programs in Fairfield, Franklin, Gallia, Greene (Xenia), Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Richland and Williams counties.
- ◆ Increase the number of treatment programs in both 407 prison and 408 jail diversion programs that are designed to change offender behavior
- ◆ Emergency funding was utilized in 407 prison diversion programs to create treatment programs in sixteen counties, and in 408 jail diversion programs to create treatment programs in twelve counties.
- ◆ Outline the specific purpose and direction of 408 jail diversion programs
- ◆ Prison diversion offenders earned \$29,070,276, paid \$1,061,702 in restitution, \$1,618,777 in court cost and fines, paid \$645,379 in child support and completed 148,542 in community service hours.

History

Community Correction Act (CCA) programs were developed in July of 1979. The purpose of this act was to divert specific offenders from state prisons by creating correctional sanctions and services at the local level. In 1994 , the act was expanded to include the diversion of offenders from local jails. Ohio's Community Correction Act program is a successful partnership between the state of Ohio and local governments creating a growing network of community sanctions in Ohio the number of Community Correction Act programs has continued to increase with the support of the Legislative and Executive branches of state government working through the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction.

CCA Prison Diversion Programs

In Fiscal Year 2007, Prison Diversion Programs received \$15,524,831 to support programs in 42 counties throughout Ohio.

- ◆ 9,373 offenders participated in CCA prison diversion programs:
 - ◆ \$1,656 annual average cost per offender
 - ◆ 89% 3rd, 4th or 5th degree felony
 - ◆ 77% Male
 - ◆ 56% White
 - ◆ 41% African American
 - ◆ Average age at admission 33 years old
 - ◆ 49% successful termination

CCA Jail Diversion Programs

In Fiscal Year 2007, Jail Diversion Programs received \$9,168,913 to support programs in 78 counties throughout Ohio.


- ◆ 19,593 offenders participated in CCA jail diversion programs:
 - ◆ \$468 annual average cost per offender
 - ◆ 91% convicted of 4th, 5th degree felony or misdemeanor crimes
 - ◆ 77% Male
 - ◆ 71% White
 - ◆ 25% African American
 - ◆ Average age at admission 32 years old
 - ◆ 74% successful termination




Level of Most Serious Instant Offense




Level of Most Serious Instant Offense
