

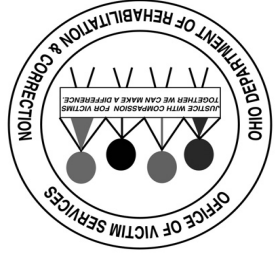
What Prisons Offer IPP?

Currently, Ohio has 8 Intensive Program Prison locations:

- ① Franklin Pre-Release Center (FPRC)
- ② Madison Correctional Institution (MACI)
- ③ North Central Correctional Institution (NCCI)
- ④ North Coast Correctional Treatment Facility (NCCTF)
- ⑤ North East Pre-Release Center (NEPRC)
- ⑥ Ohio Reformatory for Women (ORW)
- ⑦ Pickaway Correctional Institution (PCI)
- ⑧ Southeastern Correctional Institution (SCI).

What is Intensive Prison

Programming?

IPP originally started as Ohio's boot camp program under Ohio Revised Code 5120. It has been modified over time to include more program- ming and education in order to provide offenders tools needed for living a productive and crime free life and to prevent them from returning to the correctional system. The IPP allows for programming in the areas of: educational achieve- ment, vocational training, communi- ty services/conservation work, alco- hol and other drug abuse treatment, and other intensive regimens.

What are the IPP

Program Goals?

@ To reduce recidivism by providing the opportunity for an offender to acquire the academic and vocational skills needed to retain employment

@ To provide offenders with an alter- native to traditional incarceration.

@ To reduce the financial burden of long-term incarceration on Ohio citizens

Who's Eligible?

@ Non-violent offenders

@ All 3rd, 4th, or 5th degree felony offenders with a sentence of 5 years or less

@ No history of violent offense

@ Cannot be serving a mandatory sentence

@ No Sex offenders

If offenders meet the eligibility requirements for these programs, they will serve 90 days in prison and be released onto Post Release Control.

Types of IPP Programs:

@ Alcohol & Drug Intensive Program

@ Camp Meridian ~

Motivation, education, responsibil- ity, initiative, dedication, integrity, ability and new beginnings

@ Camp Reams ~

Responsibility, education, attitude, motivation, and success

@ Education Intensive Program

How Can I Be Involved?

Upon entering the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction offenders are sent to one of three reception centers throughout the state. While there, they are evaluated and given a classification based on the crime they committed and other factors. During this time offenders with no more than 60 months on their sentence may request consid- eration to enter into an IPP program. Notice is sent to the sentencing judge for recommendation. Judges are given 10 business days to respond. If recommended by the judge, offender enters the program.

If an offender is eligible, and you are registered with the Office of Victim Services, you will be notified. Any input should be given to the sentencing judge. If accepted to the program, you will be notified upon completion of the program.
