Annual Report Fiscal Year 2001

Executive Summary

Ohio Community Correction Act (CCA) programs are non-residential sanctions that allow local courts to sanction certain offenders in the community saving scarce prison and jail beds for violent offenders. This program is a partnership between the State of Ohio and the Local Community Correction Planning Boards. Each Planning Board is comprised of local officials representing all areas of the criminal justice system within the county. Each CCA program is under the control of the Local Corrections Planning Board and administered by either the county or city officials. During Fiscal Year 2001, the CCA subsidy programs received a funding appropriation of \$ 24,414,183, to support programs in 77 counties throughout Ohio.

Year End Highlights:

- ◆ Lawrence County Community Correction Program received the Clifford Skeen Award for Prison Diversion.
- ◆ Clermont County Community Correction Program received the Clifford Skeen Award for Jail Diversion.
- ◆ Instituted Community Correction Information Systems (CCIS) - Web-Based Grant Application.
- ◆ Jail and Prison Diversion Offenders performed over 356,500 hours of community service work within their respective communities.
- ◆ Offenders earned \$16,255,942; paid \$1,166,944 in restitution; \$3,499,400 in court costs; \$418,865 in child support.

CCA Prison Diversion Programs

In Fiscal Year 2001, Prison Diversion Programs received \$15,747,962 to support programs in 65 counties throughout Ohio.

- ◆ 9,064 offenders participated in CCA prison diversion programs:
 - ◆ \$1,737 annual average cost per offender
 - ◆ 19% convicted of 3rd degree felony
 - ◆ 27% convicted of 4th degree felony
 - ◆ 50% convicted of 5th degree felony
 - ◆ 81% Male
 - ◆ 53% White
 - ◆ 45% African American
 - ◆ Average age at admission 29 years old
 - ◆ 52% successful termination


CCA Jail Diversion Programs

In Fiscal Year 2001, Jail Diversion Programs received \$8,666,221 to support programs in 77 counties throughout Ohio.




- ◆ 18,637 offenders participated in CCA jail diversion programs:
 - ◆ \$465 annual average cost per offender
 - ◆ 74% convicted of misdemeanor crimes
 - ◆ 77% Male
 - ◆ 72% White
 - ◆ 24% African American
 - ◆ Average age at admission 32 years old
 - ◆ 73% successful termination
