# Annual Report Fiscal Year 2002

## Executive Summary

Ohio Community Correction Act (CCA) programs are non-residential sanctions that allow local courts to sanction certain offenders in the community saving scarce prison and jail beds for violent offenders. This program is a partnership between the State of Ohio and the Local Community Correction Planning Boards. Each Planning Board is comprised of local officials representing all areas of the criminal justice system within the county. Each CCA program is under the control of the Local Corrections Planning Board and administered by either the county or city officials. During Fiscal Year 2002, the CCA subsidy programs received a funding appropriation of \$ 22,377,966, to support programs in 79 counties throughout Ohio.

### Year End Highlights:

- ◆ Tuscarawas County Community Correction Program received the Clifford Skeen Award for Prison Diversion.
- ◆ Highland County Community Correction Program received the Clifford Skeen Award for Jail Diversion.
- ◆ Richland County Adult Probation, Electronic Monitoring Program received the Director's Award for Excellence in Community Justice.
- ◆ Jail and Prison Diversion Offenders performed over 338,987 hours of community service work within their respective communities.
- ◆ Offenders earned \$41,395,595; paid \$1,981,867 in restitution; \$5,248,445 in court costs; \$1,160,240 in child support.

## CCA Prison Diversion Programs

In Fiscal Year 2002, Prison Diversion Programs received \$14,446,756 to support programs in 45 counties throughout Ohio.

- ◆ 9,092 offenders participated in CCA prison diversion programs:
  - ◆ \$1,589 annual average cost per offender
  - ◆ 13% convicted of 3rd degree felony
  - ◆ 27% convicted of 4th degree felony
  - ◆ 52% convicted of 5th degree felony
  - ◆ 79% Male
  - ◆ 53% White
  - ◆ 45% African American
  - ◆ Average age at admission 32 years old
  - ◆ 54% successful termination

## CCA Jail Diversion Programs


In Fiscal Year 2002, Jail Diversion Programs received \$7,931,209 to support programs in 79 counties throughout Ohio.

- ◆ 20,104 offenders participated in CCA jail diversion programs:
  - ◆ \$395 annual average cost per offender
  - ◆ 5% convicted of 4th degree felony
  - ◆ 12% convicted of 5th degree felony
  - ◆ 75% convicted of misdemeanor crimes
  - ◆ 77% Male
  - ◆ 72% White
  - ◆ 24% African American
  - ◆ Average age at admission 32 years old
  - ◆ 76% successful termination






### JAIL DIVERSION PROGRAMS


