

Year End Highlights

- ◆ In Fiscal Year 2008, both the 407 Prison and 408 Jail diversion programs diverted the largest number of offenders on record. The 407 programs diverted 10, 033 offenders and the 408 programs diverted 21,068.
- ◆ Prison diversion offenders earned \$25,597,004, paid \$969,490 in restitution, \$1,593,080 in court cost and fines, paid \$601,295 in child support and completed 138,049 hours of community work service.
- ◆ Jail diversion offenders earned \$45,345,012, paid \$422,993 in restitution, \$2,616,037 in court cost and fines, paid \$778,007 in child support and completed 199,208 hours of community work service.
- ◆ Funded pilot programs are in place in seven counties to divert offenders convicted of Non-Support of Dependents from prison. Each county developed their own program based on the county’s needs and resources. In FY08, there was a 71% increase in child support paid by offenders in these programs.

FUTURE INITIATIVES

- ◆ Implement reallocation procedures in order to provide funding to areas with demonstrated needs and enhance programs that perform well.
- ◆ Develop new grant application to focus programs on either recidivism reduction or incarceration reduction.
- ◆ Develop criteria and policy to allow high performing program complete self audits every other year.



History

Community Correction Act (CCA) programs were developed in July of 1979. The purpose of this act was to divert specific offenders from state prisons by creating correctional sanctions and services at the local level. In 1994, the act was expanded to include the diversion of offenders from local jails. Ohio’s Community Correction Act program is a successful partnership between the state of Ohio and local governments creating a growing network of community sanctions in Ohio the number of Community Correction Act programs has continued to increase with the support of the Legislative and Executive branches of state government working through the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction.

CCA Prison Diversion Programs

In Fiscal Year 2008, Prison Diversion Programs received \$15,758,552 to support programs in 42 counties throughout Ohio.

- ◆ 10,033 offenders participated in CCA prison diversion programs:
 - ◆ \$1,682 annual average cost per offender
 - ◆ 17% convicted of 3rd degree felony
 - ◆ 28% convicted of 4th degree felony
 - ◆ 47% convicted of 5th degree felony
 - ◆ 79% Male
 - ◆ 55% White
 - ◆ 42% African American

CCA Jail Diversion Programs

In Fiscal Year 2008, Jail Diversion Programs received \$9,313,073 to support programs in 80 counties throughout Ohio.

- ◆ 21,068 offenders participated in CCA jail diversion programs:
 - ◆ \$477 annual average cost per offender
 - ◆ 8% convicted of 4th degree felony
 - ◆ 16% convicted of 5th degree felony
 - ◆ 67% convicted of misdemeanor crimes
 - ◆ 74% Male
 - ◆ 70% White
 - ◆ 27% African American






Level of Most Serious Instant Offense




Level of Most Serious Instant Offense
