

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Each year I am presented the opportunity to reveal the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (DRC) to the citizens of Ohio. The DRC Fiscal Year 2001 Annual Report is a chance for me to show how, despite numerous challenges facing DRC, the staff of the Department have continued to provide quality correctional services to the state of Ohio. We have met and are meeting these challenges with professionalism and integrity.

Ohio has experienced a significant reduction in the rate of recidivism. This decrease is the largest to take place since such statistics have been tracked. The recommitment of offenders within three years of their release from prison has decreased by five percent. Research has shown that part of this decrease is due to the educational programming offered in Ohio's institutions, and part of the decrease is also due to job linkage services provided to Ohio's inmates.

While the recidivism rate continues to decline, the Department has developed a major reentry initiative entitled the "Ohio Plan for Productive Offender Reentry and Recidivism Reduction" to ensure that the rate remains low. This philosophy, when put into action, provides offenders with the necessary tools and techniques that are essential for a successful reentry into society after a period of incarceration. These tools include opportunity, support and accountability. One of the many projects developing from the reentry initiative is Ohio's "reentry court," which was one of only nine national projects to receive a Department of Justice technical grant.

In June 2001 DRC officially opened the Achieving Baby Care Success Nursery (ABC'S) at the Ohio Reformatory for Women (ORW). This nursery is the first of its kind in Ohio, and among only a few nationally. ABC'S is aimed at allowing incarcerated mothers to develop and maintain that critical bond with their child. Selected women participating in the program have their newborn child live with them for up to 18 months, ensuring the mother and child leave the institution together.

The institutions strived to reach greater levels of efficiency, resulting in national recognition for the Pickaway Correctional Institution (PCI). PCI was awarded an Environmental Protection Agency national award for the most improved wastewater treatment plant in region 5 (Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota and Washington).

DRC also focused on the consolidation of mental health services this year. By combining the residential treatment units in some of the facilities, the Department saved approximately \$650,000. Further cost savings were seen when we implemented electronic job postings. The savings resulting from this innovative idea are estimated to be \$40,000 per year.

As always, DRC employees have demonstrated great generosity for others in need. The DRC family collectively raised \$818,590.76 for the Ohio Combined Charitable Campaign in 2000.

Another year of accomplishments allows me to have hope for even greater results from DRC in the years to come. We continue to have the best correctional staff in the nation.



Teacher of the Year

Joan Pierce, teacher at the Montgomery Education and Pre-Release Center (MEPRC), was selected as the Teacher of the Year for 2001. Joan began her career with DRC in 1999 as a communications instructor. She has developed lesson plans for several of the successful vocational programs at MEPRC and the Dayton Correctional Institution.

Community Justice Week

Community Justice is a way of viewing, understanding and responding to crime and the effects it has on victims, communities and offenders. Crime is recognized as harm done to a person(s) and/or community and the aim of justice is to promote understanding, accountability and healing. Offenders are held personally responsible to their victim(s) and/or community for making amends and, to the extent possible, helping to repair the damage and the injuries caused.



The Community Justice Cabinet and Councils continued to work towards a more restorative system of justice in FY 2001. A highlight of the year was the department's recognition of International Restorative Justice Week during the month of November. DRC

devoted the week of November 12-18 to raising awareness about the concept of restorative justice and the need to further embrace the concept. Department staff, victims, offenders and various community representatives worked together to make the week a success.

Victim impact panels, offender panel presentations and brown bag lunches were among a few of the exciting activities that took place across the state. Both staff and inmates participated in a variety of fundraisers that benefited local victims groups and other community organizations. Inmates at Chillicothe Correctional Institution donated over \$10,000 to organizations within the local Chillicothe community.

"Restorative Justice: Harmony and Healing" was the theme of Restorative Justice Week as well as the symposium at the Corrections Training Academy. Attorney General Betty Montgomery was the keynote speaker of the event. The diverse group of participants spent the day in discussions, networking and building new partnerships.

"The Institute"

The planning phases for the Ohio Institute on Correctional Best Practices (The Institute) began in FY 2001. Under the vision of Director Wilkinson, The Institute is intended to serve as a think tank and source of innovation and support for the justice system and corrections professionals across Ohio. These programs will be shared with staff and serve as the foundation for encouraging innovative and effective correctional practices throughout the state. The institute will provide staff with a place to gather where information and resources on Best Practices will be readily available to assist with project development and strategic planning.

The Institute will feature an Artifact Center that is dedicated to providing a historical glimpse into the prison system and the state of Ohio over the past two centuries. The Institute will also house a Resource Center and Library.

Reentry Initiative

DRC's reentry initiative, launched in 2001, is charged with conducting a thorough examination of what is being done, and what needs to be done, to support successful offender reentry back into the community. Within this framework, reentry planning will begin at inmate reception and continue through discharge and parole supervision.

A Reentry Steering Committee was formed that will oversee the reentry planning process and prepare a comprehensive report that will outline the Department's approach to reentry for years to come. This plan will serve as a strategic document that will address every facet of correctional operations that effect the reentry process.


Oversight for this initiative is housed within the Ohio Institute on Correctional Best Practices.

ADULT PAROLE AUTHORITY

MISSION OF THE ADULT PAROLE AUTHORITY

The mission of the Adult Parole Authority is to protect the public from violence and other crime through the building and sharing of offender information with victims, the courts and other criminal justice agencies, and to provide supervision of offenders who are in the community, utilizing strategies aimed at rehabilitation, incapacitation, and when necessary, punishment.

AKRON REGION

The Akron Region consists of over 100 employees and covers a ten-county area. During Fiscal Year 2001, the Akron Region implemented the "Weed and Seed" program. The objective of this program is to "weed" out crime with an increased police presence and assist residents in cleaning up properties to beautify the region.

CINCINNATI REGION

The Cincinnati Region staffs 100 plus employees and serves six counties: Hamilton, Montgomery, Miami, Clark, Preble and Greene. The Offender Services Network of the Cincinnati Region has partnered with the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services to provide cross disciplinary training to staff within the APA and local community service providers. The team works together to discuss issues regarding referral, communication and programming within the community.

CHILlicothe REGION

Serving twenty-five counties, the Chillicothe Region has actively embraced the Community Justice initiative. This Region regularly sponsors activities that allow offenders to interact with the community in a positive manner. Each year the Region organizes a community picnic that provides a chance for the offenders to better understand how their criminal behavior negatively impacts the community.

CLEVELAND PAROLE AND PROBATION

The Cleveland Parole and Probation regions provide supervision services to Cuyahoga, Lake, Geauga and Astabula counties. The Cleveland Parole and Probation regions have worked to establish community partnerships during this fiscal year. The Cleveland Probation region has assisted in developing a liaison with the Rape Victim Crisis Center to ensure that victim issues are addressed during pre-sentence investigations. This partnership also assists staff in becoming more aware of victim issues in other phases of the justice process.

COLUMBUS REGION

The Columbus Region supervises Franklin, Licking, Pickaway, Fairfield and Madison Counties. As a member of the Columbus Advisory Board, Columbus APA is working with the residents of the local community to repair and develop relationships through information sharing, training and networking.



MANSFIELD REGION








Figure 1. Counties With Largest Proportion of Intake





Figure 3. Distribution of Felony Categories for all Commitments (N =19801)




Population by Classification - Male



Population by Classification - Female




Total Inmate Population by Sex
