## Overview

The Department is committed to providing a comprehensive continuum of alcohol and other drug (AOD) treatment services. The continuum begins at DRC reception centers where inmates receive an AOD screening and 10 hours of AOD education. During FY2003, 13,163 inmates were screened and 13,223 completed the reception AOD education.

For inmates with AOD problems, the next phase of the AOD treatment continuum is provided at parent institutions. A variety of treatment services are offered based on the institutional mission, physical capacity and staffing. Inmate participation in these programs is voluntary. In FY2003 there were 33 correctional institutions in full operation. The following types of AOD programs were provided; the figure on the right indicates the number of institutions providing the service:

➤ Therapeutic Communities	5
➤ Residential Programs	7
➤ AOD / Literacy Programs	1
➤ Day Treatment Programs	15
➤ Individual and Group Counseling	17
➤ AOD Education Groups	15
➤ 12-Step / Peer (self-help groups)	10

Upon completion of a treatment program, the counselor works with the inmate to develop a continuing care plan. This plan will include participation in institutional AOD aftercare activities while incarcerated and community care when released. AOD services for offenders under DRC supervision in the community are facilitated by an Adult Parole Authority (APA) Recovery Services Administrator and eight Chemical Dependency Specialists.

The community care plan provides a transition to community process that helps complete a seamless approach tying treatment, interdiction services and detection together.


## Bureau of Recovery Services 2003 Highlights

- The Bureau of Recovery Services Training Committee provided training in the following areas:



- 165 ODRC staff attended the Ohio Alcohol and Drug Studies Institute at the Ohio University.
- 28 Institution Recovery Services staff from 4 institutions received training in delivering Cognitive Behavioral Treatment programming.
- APA Chemical Dependency Specialist screened 2208 offenders. Of those, 91% were linked to community treatment services within 10 days.
- 888 inmates released to community supervision that participated in Recovery Services programming while incarcerated were transitioned to community based programming, a 50% increase from FY02.
- Initiated "State Offender Stabilization Project" in Lucas County through the local Treatment Alternatives to Street Crimes. The project provides intensive strength-based case management services, cognitive behavioral programming, and a restorative justice component to high- risk substance abusing offenders.
- APA Chemical Dependency Specialists provided 78 hours of statewide drug and alcohol training to Parole Officers and other community stakeholders.
- Developed integrated voice response software program to schedule random drug testing for offenders under community supervision.
- Transitioned APA drug testing over to Corrections Medical Center including the addition of "on-line" computer access to drug testing results for all Parole Officers.


**ODR&C INMATE RANDOM DRUG TESTS**

**(Tested by APA, Corrections Medical Center, Contracts and Instant Tests)**




## ODRC Inmate Participants in AOD Programming Number and Percent of Participants in FY 2003


